DID YOU HEAR THAT....(GOT YOUR EARS UP? ☺ ☺ ☺)

Max Sherman(‘53) was named 1998 Texan of the Year by the Texas Legislature Conference and was honored this past March at New Braunfels. He teaches ethics and state/local government courses at the LBJ School of Public Affairs at UT, and is president of the Austin Area Research Organization.

Marion Groff(‘45) was selected as the 1998-1999 Frank Phillips College Distinguished Alumnus last April. As such, he addressed the 50th graduating class at commencement exercises. He attended FPC the first year it opened in 1949, was elected freshman class president, and wrote the FPC alma mater and fight song. Today he and his wife **Joyce Deaton**(‘48) live in Dallas, where he is retired after 45 years in the ministry. He currently serves as pastoral counselor and elder at the transdenominational Hillcrest Church in Dallas, and helps with the SMU Perkins Theological Seminary’s graduate program.

Jill Wendel(‘69), a former all-state volleyball player at PHS, attended and was honored at the high school All-Star Volleyball Tournament in Austin on July 7, which is sponsored by the Texas Girls Coaches Assn. **Demetra Prather**, her coach, was also recognized at the affair. Jill was one of the gals who were invited to play at the first-ever all-star volleyball tournament held back in 1969. This year marked the 30th anniversary.

Karen Sue Little(‘60) received the “Teacher of the Week” award last February in Fort Worth where she teaches kindergarten. This award is given to teachers across the DFW Metroplex which includes a very wide area and lots of schools. Karen was nominated by a parent and a grandparent of one of her students, and later was selected as the winner. She received \$1000, a new 35-M camera, and a lovely crystal apple (with the name of the award on it) for herself, plus \$1000 for her school. And her picture appeared in the Fort Worth and Dallas newspapers. She was also nominated for the Teacher of the Year for her school, the second time in her 30-year career.

Although this happened some while back, a similar award still bears mentioning. **Sandra McCall**(‘61), who teaches English and keyboard at Plainview High School, also was named and honored by Wal-Mart as the Teacher of the Year for 1996. Her picture also appeared in the local newspaper. It’s good to see that Sandra and Karen Sue proudly represent the many fine teachers that PHS has turned out. We are certain that there have been numerous other like awardees who deserve our tribute.

EX TEACHERS IN THE NEWS

Lera Rash, who taught in the elementary grades for 37 years and turned 80 this past year, moved from Borger back to her hometown of Greenville TX last October. She remarked that it was very hard to leave her old friends after all these years, and almost as hard to downsize from her home to a one-bedroom apartment. **Elouise Skinner**, who taught grade school for 25 years, and is now 83 (and her late mother lived to 101!), moved from Borger to Houston in June, also to an apartment.

Erma Whittet, who taught both 2nd and 3rd grades for 23 years, is now 90 years old and lives in a retirement manor in Muskogee OK. This past fall she received a visit from three of her former students, all of the Class of '56: **Deanna Hatley, Rinky Chivers, and Mary Ann Campbell**. They all had a great time of catching up on each other's lives and reminiscing about their days in Phillips. This little reunion spawned from the death and funeral in 1998 of the three ladies' classmate and dear friend, **Carol Sue Martindale**, who was also the niece of Erma Whittet. Erma says, "I don't know how she (the news reporter) got the story down - we all talked at once!" Erma has sent \$100 to the Alumni Association in memory of Carol Sue.

Helen Bisbee, who lives in a retirement home in Lubbock, celebrated her 94th birthday last October. A party was held for her at which she played several songs on the piano and danced a little jig. She undoubtedly is in good physical health despite her age. For those of you too young to know, Helen was the elementary music director of the "Bisbee Darlings", as we were affectionately dubbed, and the Spanish teacher in junior high during the years 1946 - 1966. Very few people know that prior to her teaching career, she served in the WACS in the Philippines. Then after leaving PHS, she joined the Peace Corps at age 62, having had to pass a rigorous physical test, and served 2 years in British Honduras training teachers. Sandwiched between the Peace Corps and her retirement in Lubbock, she helped and worked with the Indians in Arizona for a few years. It's too bad she hasn't found time to write her autobiography... it would be most interesting indeed, to say the least!

Louise Boyd, age 78, passed away last March in Odessa where she was a longtime resident after leaving Phillips. At PHS she was an English teacher and a notorious, controversial, vocabulary drill instructor from 1953 - 1966. **Mable Marshall** also died sometime during the past year, the details of which aren't available. She taught the 5th/6th grades at Phillips Elementary from 1952 - 1960 and was preceded in death by her husband **Vonden Marshall**, also a Phillips school teacher and coach.

Joe Hayes will be inducted into the WTAMU Athletic Hall of Champions this month. In 1995 he was also inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame as its 99th member. He lettered in both football & basketball while attending West Texas State from 1935 to 1939. After WW II, he was the head basketball coach at PHS for 10 years....the rest you know. Joe is now 82.

Peggy May of Amarillo, who is **Chesty Walker's** younger sister by 19 years, happened to be dining at Sutphen's BBQ in Borger where she saw a PHS afghan on display. She then purchased one from the Association as a Christmas gift for her niece **Penny Walker('54)**. They do make nice gifts!

PHILLIPS PET CO....TO BE OR NOT TO BE, THAT'S THE QUESTION

This probably comes as no news to people living in the Southwest who have retained any vestige of their sight and hearing faculties, but perhaps there are some of you in the Northeast or on the West Coast who haven't heard all the scuttlebutt that was going on from October through March concerning PPC. PPC was all set to sell 55% if its refining and marketing business to, and merge with, Ultramar Diamond Shamrock Corp. (Diamond Shamrock formerly merged with Ultramar back in 1996). What this joint venture would have meant locally was that the Refinery and NGL plants would have become a part of the new entity, Diamond 66, and that there might have been some significant job cuts in the area before this thing played out.

However it was announced in late March that the deal had fallen through because the two companies could not come to an agreement on some terms of the merger transaction. So it is still the Borger 66 Refinery and NGL Center. Back in the 70's the "66" company emblem was changed from the black-and-orange to the red-and-white shield. People here were already conditioned and resigned to start seeing the replacement green-and-white diamonds at the gas stations since it was passed off by the media as a done deal with only a few formalities to be taken care of, but surprise! surprise!
